Promoting Sexual Health (P8721). The purpose of this course is to provide students with an introduction to the practical use of individual, interpersonal, organizational and community level theories in explaining and changing sexual and reproductive health behavior. Specific topics include theoretical foundations for the promotion of sexual health, including cognitive-behavioral, cultural and structural approaches; and the tension between population and community-based intervention strategies. The overall goal of this course is for students to learn how to apply theory to the practice of sexual health programming and how practice informs sexual health theory.

Introduction to Public Health. Public Health is the science of preventing disease and promoting well-being among individuals in their communities from a population approach, using qualitative and quantitative research methods to examine the distribution of health and ill-health in society. Classically, the focus of public health has been on the analysis, surveillance and control of disease and illness, often infectious disease. More recently, it has shifted to the promotion of healthy behaviors, with the intent to prevent, rather than treat, disease. In the medieval period, public health efforts were epitomized by quarantine to prevent the spread of plague; in the 19th century, public health meant the promotion of the “sanitary movement,” providing clean water systems to prevent the spread of cholera. Since then, public health has been informed by advances in the clinical understanding of disease, statistical techniques to compare the risk of health disorders across sub-groups of populations, and social scientific approaches to understanding poverty and disadvantage. Today, public health explores social conditions on the local and global levels that contribute to ill-health. Its scope of work includes the distribution and impact of infectious diseases (HIV, Hepatitis-C) as well as other chronic conditions (diabetes, hypertension, asthma), and the social and environmental factors that sustain them. This course will provide a background and conceptual framework for understanding the history and scope of public health. It will take an inventory of the standard toolkit of public health, from epidemiological analyses of the distribution of diseases to social determinants of health. Finally, it will demonstrate how these analytic tools actually work through the use of case studies, primarily regarding health issues in New York City.

Intervention Design. Public health professionals regardless of their discipline must have a basic understanding of how multi-level public health interventions are designed and implemented. Through a foundational level of understanding of intervention design researchers will strengthen their ability to design studies that will translate findings into interventions at multiple levels. Evaluators and policy analysts increase their potential for designing most effective evaluation studies and to make sound decisions at the time of developing and recommending public health policies. Clinica Bienestar: An HIV treatment intervention for Latinos in Philadelphia
